

SCHEDULE DRUGS

- I** Heroin, LSD, mescaline and peyote, amphetamine variants, marijuana, other hallucinogens.
- II** Opium, morphine, codeine, methadone, cocaine, barbiturates.
- III** Anabolic steroids; opium; codeine; morphine; barbiturates; other narcotics, stimulants and depressants.
- IV** Barbiturates; benzodiazepines; chloral hydrate; other narcotics, stimulants and depressants.
- V** Opium; codeine; other narcotics and depressants.

HEALTH RISKS

Drug Type	Common Name	Health Risks
Alcohol	Booze, beer, wine coolers, liquor.	Lowered resistance to disease; insomnia, unprotected sex; sexual dysfunction; depression.
Marijuana	Grass, reefer, pot, weed.	Heart, lung, brain damage; paranoia, decreased motivation; depression; impaired memory.
Steroids	Anabolic/Androgenic (roids, juice).	Aggressiveness; acne; mood swings; atrophy of testes; breast enlargement in males; breast reduction in females; high blood pressure; liver damage.
Solvents-Inhalants	Acetone, freons, nitrous oxide.	Heart failure; respiratory arrest; liver and brain damage.
Depressants	Alcohol, ludes barbiturates.	Disorientation; insomnia; depression; liver damage; convulsions.
Hallucinogens	PCP, LSD, angel dust, mushrooms.	Agitation; extreme hyperactivity.
Stimulants	Cocaine, diet pills, amphetamines.	Headaches; depression; malnutrition; anorexia.
Narcotics	Smack, codeine, heroine, lords.	Respiratory arrest; sleepiness, nausea, organ damage.

FEDERAL LAW

Possession of Schedule I Drugs:
1st Offense: 10 yrs.-life, 10 yrs. minimum; if death or serious injury, 20 yr. minimum; up to \$4 million fine individual, \$10 million other than individual.
2nd Offense: 20 yrs.- life, 20 yr. minimum; if death or serious injury, not less than life; up to \$8 million fine - individual, \$20 million other than individual.

Possession of Schedule II Drugs:
1st Offense: 5 - 40 yrs., 5 yrs. minimum; if death or serious injury, 20 yr. minimum; up to \$2 million fine individual, \$5 million other than individual.
2nd Offense: 10 yrs.- life, 10 yr. minimum; if death or serious injury, not less than life; up to \$4 million fine individual, \$10 million other than individual.

Possession of Schedule III Drugs:
1st Offense: 0 - 5 yrs.; up to \$250,000 fine individual, \$1 million other than individual.
2nd Offense: 0 - 10 yrs.; up to \$500,000 fine individual, \$2 million other than individual.

Possession of Schedule IV Drugs:
1st Offense: 0 - 3 yrs.; up to \$250,000 fine individual, \$1 million other than individual.
2nd Offense: 0 - 6 yrs.; up to \$500,000 fine individual, \$2 million other than individual.

Possession of Schedule V Drugs:
1st Offense: 0 - 1 yr.; up to \$100,000 fine individual, \$250,000 fine other than individual.
2nd Offense: 0 - 2 yrs.; up to \$200,000 fine individual, \$500,000 other than individual.

CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES CRIMES AND PENALTIES UNDER MINNESOTA LAW

	Sale	Possession	Penalty
First Degree	10+ grams cocaine, 50+ grams of other narcotic drug, 200+ doses hallucinogen, 50 kilos marijuana.	25+ grams cocaine, 500+ grams of other narcotic drug, 500+ doses hallucinogen, 100+ kilos marijuana.	0-30 yrs., 4 yr. minimum if prior drug felony; up to \$1 million fine. Imprisonment to 86 to 158 months.
Second Degree	3+ grams cocaine, 10+ grams of other narcotic drug, 50 doses hallucinogen, 25+ kilos marijuana, or sale of Schedule I or II narcotic drug either to a person under 18 or in a school zone, park zone, or public housing zone.	6+ grams cocaine, 50+ grams of other narcotic drug, 100+ doses hallucinogen, 25+ kilos marijuana.	0-25 yrs., 3 yr. minimum if prior drug felony; up to \$500,000 fine. Imprisonment to 48 to 108 months.
Third Degree	Narcotic drug, 10+ doses hallucinogen, 5+ kilos marijuana, or sale of any Schedule I, II, or III drug (except a Schedule I or II narcotic drug or marijuana) to a person under 18 or employment of person under 18 to sell same.	3+ grams cocaine, 10+ grams of other narcotic drug, 10+ kilos marijuana, and any amount of a Schedule I or II narcotic drug in a school zone, park zone, or public housing zone.	0-20 yrs., 2 yr. minimum if prior drug felony; up to \$250,000 fine. Probation to 21-30 months; imprisonment to 34-65 months.
Fourth Degree	Any Schedule I, II, or III drug (except marijuana), or sale of marijuana in a school zone, park zone, or public housing zone or any Schedule IV or V drug to person under 18 or conspiracy for the same.	10 doses hallucinogen.	0-15 yrs., 1 yr. minimum if prior drug felony; up to \$100,000 fine. Probation to 12-21 months; imprisonment to 25-41.
Fifth Degree	Marijuana, or any Schedule IV drug.	All Schedule I, II, III, or IV drugs except 42.5 grams or less of marijuana.	Probation to 12-19 months; imprisonment to 21 months.

STUDENT POLICY

Alcohol and other drug use potentially affects the safety, health, and quality of life of all students and restricts Minnesota State University, Mankato's ability to carry out its mission. The use, consumption, and/or distribution of alcohol/drugs is prohibited on the MSU campus. Specific violations of the campus policy can be found within the MSU *Statement of Student Responsibilities*.

Responsibility #4. Individuals will adhere to federal, state, and local laws, along with MnSCU System and University regulations that govern individual actions and relationships among community members. Examples of violations: unauthorized or illegal consumption or possession of alcohol; public drunkenness; possession, sale or distribution of illegal material or substances; violation of University or departmental policies; violation of law; possession of false identification.

Responsibility #8. Individuals will contribute to a safe environment within the University community. Examples of

violations: failure to assume responsibility for the actions of one's guest(s); intoxication that disrupts other individuals or the University's activities/administrative responsibilities; or self-injurious substance abuse.

Violations of campus policy are adjudicated through the Office of the Vice President for Student Affairs (for off-campus students and incidents occurring at most campus locations) or the Department of Residential Life (for violations in the residence halls by students living there). Potential consequences for violations of law or policy include, but are not limited to: (1) arrest and conviction; (2) University disciplinary probation, suspension, or expulsion; (3) confiscation; (4) restitution; (5) community service; (6) completion of an alcohol and drug education seminar and/or a chemical use assessment and recommendations; (7) loss of parking privileges on campus for alcohol impaired driving; (8) room relocation or termination of a student's residence hall contract with restriction from the halls. MSU will impose sanctions for alcohol/drug violations consistent with federal, state and local laws; sanctions may include arrest and prosecution. Minnesota State University, Mankato recognizes any use of alcohol or other drugs imposes a risk to the health and wellness of the community. Subsequently, various methods of outreach encourage the safety and well-being of students, faculty and staff, and are parallel to the University's mission. The dual focus of prevention and intervention completes the comprehensive program which employs campus-wide strategies to transform social norms. Programs utilize current researched prevention methods in collaboration with students, faculty, staff, and the surrounding community.

Students may seek assistance or become involved in prevention efforts by contacting the Student Health Services/Office of Health Education, 507-389-5689. Specific programs include social marketing to promote lower-risk student substance use choices, teaching guidelines for the use or non-use of alcohol, tobacco or other drugs, Health Peers Reaching Out (PROs), and classroom presentations. Students may address concerns regarding alcohol, tobacco, and other drug use with a health educator. This can involve a general discussion, community or on-campus options, and education about the dangers of substance use/abuse. The Counseling Center is available for alcohol screenings and short-term general counseling by a licensed psychologist.

MANKATO ORDINANCES

Individuals attending Minnesota State University, Mankato are expected to obey Mankato city laws and ordinances. Some of the relevant codes state:

1. It is unlawful for a person under the age of eighteen (unless accompanied by parent or guardian 21 or older) to enter or attempt to enter premises licensed for on-sale of intoxicating liquor or 3.2% malt beverages without having on their person a valid, unaltered driver's license or picture identification card issued by a state or U.S. government identifying such person or a valid passport with their date of birth.
2. You must have a license to sell liquor. Asking for donations or selling glasses may constitute a misdemeanor or gross misdemeanor.
3. It is unlawful for a person to possess a container of alcoholic beverage on a city street or parking lot. The only exception is a City Park parking lot unless specifically posted.

MINNESOTA LAW

(This is not a complete listing)

Not a Drop Law

If a person under age 21 consumes any amount of alcohol and drives any motor vehicle, a mandatory loss of drivers license will occur along with any other relevant penalties.

DWI

It is a crime for any person to drive, operate, or be in physical control of a motor vehicle within this state or upon the water or ice of any boundary water of this state, while the person is under the influence of alcohol, a controlled or hazardous substance, or a combination of the two, or the person has an "alcohol concentration" of 0.10 or more.

DUI

Driving with an alcohol concentration of .04 or more is relevant evidence of whether or not the person is under the influence of alcohol and therefore subject to arrest.

Implied consent

By driving a motor vehicle in this state, a person agrees to submit to testing for intoxication.

Possession or Consumption By Persons Under The Age Of 21

It is unlawful for any person under the age of 21 years to possess any alcoholic beverage with the intent to consume or actually consume it at any place other than the household of the person's parent or guardian, and with their immediate supervision.

Misrepresentation of Age

It is unlawful for any person under the age of 21 years to claim to be 21 years old or older for the purpose of purchasing alcoholic beverages.

Furnishing Alcohol To Persons Under 21

It is unlawful to sell, barter, furnish or give alcoholic beverages to persons under 21.

Sexual Contact Under the Influence of Alcohol or Other Drugs

A person who is under the influence of alcohol or other mind altering drugs, cannot give legal consent to a sexual act whether the act is oral, anal or vaginal penetration: or other contact, or near contact, of breasts or genitals.

Tobacco

It is unlawful for a person under the age of 18 to purchase or attempt to purchase a tobacco product, or for a person to permit the use of his or her identification by a person under the age of 18 for the purchase of a tobacco product.

*This document complies with Federal laws (The Safe and Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act Amendments of 1989 and the Drug-Free Work Place Act of 1989) which require that all colleges and universities, including Minnesota State University, Mankato, provide a program to prevent the illicit use of drugs and the abuse of alcohol by its students, faculty, and staff. The University's failure to comply with these laws may make the University and its' students ineligible to receive federal funds or any form of financial assistance under any federal program, including student loans.
