WHAT DEGREES AND PROGRAMS DO WE OFFER?

The School of Nursing has been providing quality nursing education since 1953. Undergraduate programs lead to a 4-year Bachelor of Science degree and includes the traditional Pre-Licensure Program, for students who wish to obtain a registered nurse licence, and the RN Baccalaureate Completion Program, for Associate degree RNs who wish to advance to a Bachelor of Science degree.

CAREER OPPORTUNITIES AVAILABLE FOR STUDENTS COMPLETING THIS PROGRAM

The nursing curriculum is designed to provide opportunities for the student to develop a sound theoretical and clinical foundation for the practice of professional nursing. The graduate is prepared for a variety of roles in the community, including the responsibility for health promotion; prevention of disease; and caring for the sick in the community, the hospital, and the home. An understanding of people and how they adapt to the environment is essential to the provision of these health-care services.

Employers rate Minnesota State Mankato nursing graduates "top-choice" because they adapt well to a variety of roles in all types of health care agencies. Graduates enjoy nearly a 100 percent placement rate in a wide variety of health care environments, including hospitals, public health, home care, nursing homes, public and parochial schools, and industry. Recent graduate surveys reveal alums are starting with an annual salary above \$50,000.

Academic opportunities

Graduates of the Pre-Licensure Program are eligible to take the National Council Licensure Examination, Next Generation NCLEX (NGN-RN). Successfully passing this exam permits the graduate to practice as a registered nurse (RN). Graduates of both undergraduate programs will have met the requirements for certification as public health nurses in Minnesota and for school nurse licensure.

EXAMINING THE QUALITY OF OUR PROGRAM

Accreditation

The undergraduate programs are approved by the Minnesota Board of Nursing and accredited by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education, One Dupont Circle, NW, Suite 530, Washington, D.C. 20036.

Faculty

Students in the baccalaureate programs enjoy courses taught by professionally educated faculty, the majority being masters or doctorally

prepared. The School of Nursing employs qualified instructors to provide teaching expertise in classroom, simulation laboratories and clinical experiences.

Faculty awards and honors

School of Nursing faculty are committed to excellence in both teaching and scholarship. Recent faculty honors include the prestigious MN Nurses Association Nurse Educator of the Year Award for 2020, Distinguished Professor and Founding Director of the Glen Taylor Nursing Institute for Family and Society, and the 2021 Distinguished Faculty Scholar Award.

STUDENT EXPERIENCE/PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS

Faculty/student ratio

1:32 for lecture classes, 1:6-8 for experiential learning. (64 students in cohort)

Family Focused Nursing

Supported by the Glen Taylor Nursing Institute for Family & Society, the nursing curriculum emphasizes nursing practice with a focus on the individual, family and society. Students are prepared to be future leaders in family focused nursing at the local, state, national and international level.

Special programs

In addition to the traditional classroom, nursing students enjoy a variety of hands-on clinical experiences in rural and metro/urban settings. The clinical resources include hospitals in Mankato and the Twin Cities area, long-term care facilities, a regional mental health center, and various public health and home care agencies. In the Maverick Family Nursing Simulation Center, students continue to practice and enhance their clinical skills in the state-of-the-art facility throughout the 4 semester program. Simulation provides students the opportunity to experience high risk/low occurrence situations in a safe and controlled environment. Both clinical and simulation experiences begin in the student's junior year, following official admission to the Pre-Licensure program.

Admission to the School of Nursing

Admission to the Pre-Licensure Program is a competitive process apart from admission to the University. Completing pre-requisite coursework does not guarantee admission. Each applicant pool is rank ordered using the Core pre-requisite GPA, the total TEAS Exam score and the group interview score. Full admission requires an active nursing assistant certification, in addition to receiving approval to work with patients, without supervision, from the Minnesota Department of Health.

Clubs and organizations

Membership in the Student Nurses Association (SNA) is open to all pre-nursing and nursing students.

Scholarships Available

Through our endowments and the generosity of our alums and friends, the School of Nursing is able to award scholarships over \$92,000 to students enrolled in our programs. Incoming students may also qualify for the full spectrum of financial aid including Presidential and Talent Grant scholarships, state and federal grants, federal loan programs, and federal or state workstudy opportunities.

HOW DO I PREPARE?

In addition to meeting the standards for admission to the University, pre-nursing students would benefit from a preparation strong in biology and chemistry course work. Nursing students find that strong interpersonal communication skills and leadership ability serve them well in the rigorous nursing curriculum.
