Students who begin their French studies at Minnesota State University, Mankato at the 100 or 200 level may count credits from FREN 201 and FREN 202 toward the total credits required for the French major, but these credits will not replace any specific program requirements listed above.	
Students may be allowed to substitute other courses for the standard requirements listed above. Often, this will occur when a student chooses to participate in a study abroad program, when a special one-time course is offered, or when a motivated student chooses to pursue an independent study with a program faculty member.
