#### **OVERVIEW**

The Creative Writing Program is staffed by acclaimed poets and prose writers. We believe students at all levels of instruction should be guided by teachers who are practicing professionals, who are deep in their own creative work, and who are versed in what it takes to bring creative works to completion.

We believe that writing and reading are complementary activities, and so students in our programs read some of the best literary works of the past and present, while exploring issues of craft and genre that will allow them to take their own writing to a new level.

#### Faculty/Student Ratio:

The faculty/student ratio is approximately 1:20.

#### Student Creative Success:

Our graduates have brought in major grants from national and state-level arts organizations, published creative works in many magazines, and written both bestselling and critically acclaimed books.

#### Chapters/Organizations:

Students have the opportunity to join a variety of student organizations at the undergraduate and graduate level that build community and enrich the educational experience.

- » Sigma Tau Delta, English Honor Society: Sigma Tau Delta's central purpose is to confer distinction upon students of the English language and literature in undergraduate, graduate, and professional studies.
- » Society for Technical Communication (STC), Minnesota State University, Mankato Chapter: The Minnesota State University, Mankato STC chapter organizes online programs with invited speakers. Meetings help members to network, promote professionalism, and learn about the technical communication industry.
- » Graduate Scholars of English Association (GSEA): The purpose of this organization is to unify the body of graduate students and scholars within the Teaching English as a Second Language, Technical Communications, Literature, English Studies, and Writing Certificate fields to create a more creative, academic, and peerfocused community. The general emphasis of this graduate student organization is to foster, provide, and expand scholarly and professional development for graduate students.

#### Department Publications:

Our students have the opportunity to contribute to various publications through our department.

- » Blue Earth Review: Blue Earth Review is Minnesota State University, Mankato's literary magazine. Before being wholly revamped and renamed in 2003, BER was published under such titles as Medicine Jug, The Muse, and Minnesota River Review.
- » The Corresponder: The Corresponder was founded over 30 years ago by Minnesota State University professor Robert C. Wright as a means of celebrating the achievement of Minnesota writers. It continues today as a biannual review of new books of poetry, fiction, creative nonfiction, and selected works in other areas.
- » Maverick Messenger: The Maverick Messenger is a studentrun newsletter featuring articles on technology, cross-culture communication, web design, career advancement, and much more. This award-winning newsletter is recognized by the Society of Technical Communication.
- » Nineteenth-Century Gender Studies: Nineteenth-Century Gender Studies is a peer-reviewed, online journal committed to publishing insightful and innovative scholarship on gender studies and nineteenth-century British literature, art, and culture. The journal is a collaborative effort that brings together scholars from a variety of universities to create a unique voice in the field.

#### Study Abroad:

Our students can take advantage of the many study abroad programs through the Kearney International Center, some of which allow students to pay the tuition rate of their home institution, thus reducing the study abroad costs. We offer faculty-led study abroad opportunities to Costa Rica and England and we also have partnerships with universities abroad including Queen's University in Belfast in Northern Ireland and Han University Arnhem in Netherlands.

#### Scholarships:

The department awards scholarships to returning students based on academic merit and need.
