Career Opportunities:

Dance alumni work professionally as dancers, choreographers, teachers, therapists, health & wellness, and, producers. They emerge from the Dance Program with multiple with skill sets that applies across many dimensions of their field. Theatre skills of acting, directing, management, design, and crafts, are applicable to the entire entertainment industry, including theatre, film, television, radio, etc. As a communication art form, theatre skills are immediately transferable to sales, personal management, public relations, and anything involving interpersonal communication.

QUALITY OF OUR PROGRAM

We have ten full-time faculty members with terminal degrees like the Ph.D., Ed.D. and MFA. The department has two professional staff and welcomes professional guest artists and adjuncts every term.

Our faculty are very active and successful in national organizations such as: The American College Dance Association, The Association for Theater in Higher Education, The Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival, The National Dance Education Organization, and The United States Institute of Theater Technology. Faculty have published their work and been awarded for their scholarly research. Others have received national awards for their choreographic or costume design work.

STUDENT EXPERIENCE

Faculty/Student Ratio:

1:10 undergraduate and 1.1 graduate student-to-faculty ratios.

Student/Faculty Collaboration:

All faculty involve both undergraduate and graduate students in their research and production efforts. The results of these collaborative efforts are presented on stage and at professional conferences.

Performance Opportunities:

We have an ambitious production schedule including more offerings than any school in the multi-state region and with a total audience of close to 40,000 patrons each year.

Our season consists of five major theatrical productions during the Mainstage Season, four Studio Season Shows and two Dance Concerts in an academic year. We also feature a professional summer stock series, Highland Summer Theatre, featuring four two productions utilizing professional actors and students.

The Mainstage Season consists of five full-scale theatre productions, four of which are mounted in the Ted Paul Theatre and two more in the Andreas Theatre. Recent productions include: *H.M.S. Pinafore, Good for Otto, Hay Fever, Wounded Healers, Tartuffe, and the Sound of Music.*

The Studio Season of four smaller productions is featured in our intimate black box Andreas Theatre and they are typically directed by our MFA graduate directing students. Recent productions include: *Atreus* (an original production), *Silent Sky, Cloud 9, Nocturne* and *Hedwig* and the

Angry Inch.

Our dance concerts feature original choreography from our students and faculty. We also offer a "Screen Dance" series.

Recent productions for Highland Summer Theatre (celebrating its 54th year) include: Baskerville, A Gentleman's Guide to Love and Murder, Shadowlands, and Sister Act.

Facilities:

The Earley Center for Performing Arts houses two performance venues (Ted Paul and Andreas Theatres), classrooms, dance studios, a green room, dressing rooms, multiple offices spaces, and storage spaces.

Ted Paul Theatre: A 479-seat, fully modern (renovated in 2018) proscenium stage complete with fly capabilities, hydraulic stage pit, advanced lighting system, highly sophisticated sound system, and wellequipped adjacent scene and costume shops. Andreas Theatre: A state-of-the-art black box (opened Spring of 2000) with totally flexible theatre seating of 250. Included in this complex is a dance studio (which alternates as a third performance space), computerized design laboratory, and specialized paint booth.
