ABOUT OUR PROGRAM

The mission of the Department of Special Education is to prepare quality and principled professionals to educate children and young adults with Autism Spectrum Disorders, Developmental Disabilities, Emotional Behavioral Disorders, and Learning Disabilities. Our undergraduate Academic and Behavioral Strategist (ABS) program prepares teachers to teach students with mild/moderate learning disabilities, emotional/behavioral disorders, autism spectrum disorders, and developmental disabilities. Being a special education teacher is an opportunity to have a positive, lasting impact on the lives of children and youth with special needs. Special Education is specially designed instruction that often incorporates related services, to meet the educational, social, emotional, and vocational needs of students with disabilities.

Our ABS bachelor's degree program is offered on our Mankato campus or as an online program. The undergraduate ABS program at the Mankato campus is five semesters long and is a full-time, mostly day-time commitment. The undergraduate ABS online program generally requires two years to complete, with online classes meeting one evening per week, including summer courses. The online program is designed for those working as paraprofessionals during the day. Both programs prepare teacher candidates for Minnesota's K12 ABS license. This cross-categorical license allows teachers to teach students with mild/moderate learning disabilities, emotional/behavioral disorders, autism spectrum disorders, and developmental disabilities. This program prepares new teachers for the classrooms of today where special education teachers often have students with a variety of learning needs.

Students typically apply to the Mankato program during the fall of their sophomore year or apply to the online program prior to completing an Associate's degree or transfer pathway program from a community college. The program runs as a cohort model; all students admitted to a program during a given year go through the program together, following the same sequence of courses.

CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

There is an increasing demand for special education teachers across the nation. In every state the demand for highly qualified special education teachers exceeds the available supply. Vacancies vary by state, according to the type of special educator needed and the regions within the state. Generally, rural and urban areas have a significant need for licensed teachers across all areas of special education.

Special education requires a wide variety of skills and aptitudes, including a record of strong academic performance; a talent for working with children; organizational and communication skills; the power to influence, motivate and train others; and creativity.
