Career Development Center (CDC)

- Handshake (formerly MavJobs): The #1 career network for college students and graduates. Handshake is a one-stop-shop for finding jobs and internships, connecting with employers and CDC staff, finding out about career events and other CDC programs, and so much more! All enrolled students have a Handshake account and can log-in with their StarlD and password at link.mnsu.edu/handshake.
- Career QuickStop Drop-in Hours: Drop-in sessions are held when classes are in session and specific hours are posted online. One hour appointments can also be scheduled in-person, by phone, or through Handshake. Topics include major choice and career assessment, job and internship search, resumes and cover letters, Linkedin, interviewing, and other career-related topics.
- The CDC Website: The site is a comprehensive tool that students/alumni can use to access a wide variety of career planning and job search information and resources.
- Classroom Career & Job Search Education: CDC staff provide numerous guest lectures and workshops on career and job search topics targeted to specific majors and class levels. Presentation requests can be submitted via the CDC website.
