It has, and continues, to make a difference. I believe these staff members deserve more than a "thank you note." The ritual of an end of year staff banquet, where some form of in-person acknowledgement/celebration of the impact they made, can create that powerful, meaningful, moment and shared experience. What can we do together, what can I do, to make something like this work?"

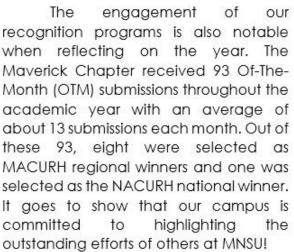


# Leadership Review: NRHH

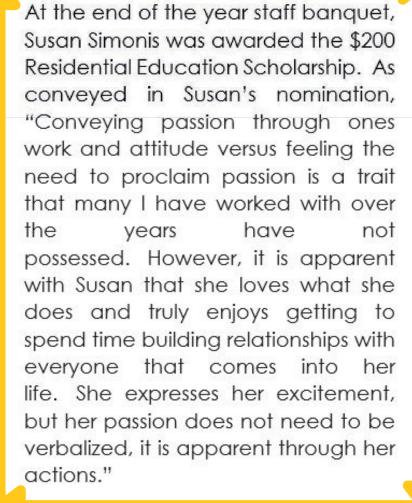

# Year in Reviewits Stadium Heights

Stadium Heights, like the rest of our campus, experienced some ups and downs throughout this past year but ultimately, these opportunities for growth helped create a better sense of community in the apartments. In summer 2020, Building 741 was taken offline for academic year occupancy and 11 of the 12 units were prepped to be used as Quarantine & Isolation Housing for students in need of a separate space if they tested positive for COVID-19 or came into contact with someone who had. Additionally, all our 5-person apartments were limited to a maximum occupancy of 3 students living per apartment to reduce density in the apartments. A nice benefit to this, though, was it allowed students additional closet/dresser space and a 2<sup>nd</sup> bed too.

Despite all the changes to the delivery method of classes and campus programs, many of our annual events still occurred, with CAs hanging out with their residents weekly, hosting WOWs, and completing monthly MavChats with each of their residents. In August 2020, we launched our 3° year of Building Battles- our twice a semester building vs. building competition where residents earn points for their building by attending their CA's hangouts, attending WOWs, turning in grades to their Hall Director, Dan, and by competing in building wide competitions. This fall, Building 731 swept the competition twice while this spring, both Building 711 and Building 701 found themselves hoisting the Stadium Heights Cup as the victors.

During TOPS, Stadium Heights won the 2021 Commitment to Student Leadership Award for hosting "Pre-Finals Week Study Break", a weeklong program in December providing a way to relieve stress for students and providing them with social opportunities to bring them closer together during the height of the pandemic in Minnesota.

This summer, we are working to replace all of the refrigerators in every apartment as well as continuing an ongoing flooring project, replacing the carpet in every apartment with floating gravity tile flooring.
