Environmental Committee Accomplishments in the 2015-2016 Academic Year

1. Climate Action Plan

Over the summer of 2015 the Climate Action Plan (CAP) Subcommittee developed a document listing measurements and criteria of success for each action step in the Plan. On September 3, 2015, the CAP was presented to Meet & Confer and on October 7 to the Council of Deans; the response was positive. Pending approval by the Cabinet, liaisons from the Committee met individually with CAP responsible parties to discuss implementation of the plan and the reporting of the successful completion of action steps. A summary table of the CAP was made available to the responsible parties on One Drive to facilitate reporting. On March 1, 2016, the Committee learned that the Cabinet had officially authorized moving forward with the Plan. The CAP Subcommittee is moving forward with the writing of a first-year CAP progress report, to highlight major successes of the Plan in the 2015-2016 academic year. 2. Sustainability Expo

On March 20, 2016 from 11:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. a Sustainability Expo was held in the Centennial Student Union. The event was sponsored by the Environmental Committee and Library Services at Minnesota State Mankato, Transition Mankato, and the Center for Earth Spirituality and Rural Ministry. The 2016 Expo's theme was Sustainable Food and was held in connection with the Minnesota State Mankato's Common Read program. The event went smoothly, with over 160 people and 27 organizations in attendance. Twelve different informational programs were offered throughout the day. Programs included topics like "Building Regional Food Systems" presented by Jim Gerhke, Director of Entrepreneurial Development & Communications for the Minnesota Community Action Partnership and "Food Security and Food Sovereignty: Lessons from India" offered by Jim Dontje, Director of the Johnson Center for Environmental Innovation at Gustavus Adolphus College. KEYC covered the event and afterwards broadcast a short video. Door prizes were awarded throughout the day. 3. RecycleMania 2016

The Recycling Sub-Committee of the University Environmental Committee participated in the national RecycleMania program for the fourth year in a row. Minnesota State University, Mankato competed against 350 other colleges and universities from 48 states in the United States, the District of Columbia, and Canada representing 4.4 million students.

This year's contest was marketed using ideas from webinars and by posting updates on the University's "Green Campus" website. Display tables were set up in the Highland Center lobby area to disseminate information about the campus recycling program, the RecycleMania contest, and to increase awareness about the Campus-wide Environmental Committee's purpose, objectives and activities. The University's recycling data was provided by the campus waste handler, LJP Waste & Recycling, and the data was entered weekly into the online database by Sub-Committee members.

Competing schools in the eight-week competition were ranked according to how much recycling, trash and food waste they collected. Between the early-February kickoff and the tournament's final weigh-in on April 2, participating schools collectively recycled or composted 80 million pounds of recyclables and organic materials, preventing the release of 122,000 metric tons of carbon dioxide equivalent (MTCO₂E) into the atmosphere, which is equivalent to preventing annual emissions from 24,000 cars.

MSU Mankato's rankings in specific categories were as follows:

- Grand Champion (recycling rate as a percentage of overall waste): MSU Mankato ranked 204 out of 208 total competitors
- Per Capita Classic (recycling of paper, cardboard, and bottles and cans per person): MSU Mankato ranked 213 out of 269 total competitors
- Gorilla Prize (recycling the highest gross tonnage of combined paper, cardboard and bottles and cans): MSU Mankato ranked 185 out of 276 total competitors
- Waste Minimization (least overall waste per person): MSU Mankato ranked 72 out of 114 total competitors
- Recycled Paper: MSU Mankato ranked 62 out of 91 total competitors
- Bottles and Cans: MSU Mankato ranked 41 out of 81 total competitors

MSU Mankato also participated in the "Game Day Basketball" subcategory event. Our University ranked 15 out of 24 colleges and universities that took part in this special category. Schools were compared based on recycling and waste minimization efforts made during a single home basketball game. Student volunteers were recruited for the "Game Day Basketball event" through OrgSync.

4. George Boody lecture

The Environmental Committee organized and sponsored a lecture on campus on October 21, 2015, by George Boody titled "The Necessity of Sustainable Agriculture for Healthy Communities in Rural Minnesota." Mr. Boody is the Executive Director of the Land Stewardship Project, a private, non-profit organization dedicated to creating transformational change to the food and farming system. 5. Film showing: This Changes Everything

On February 27, 2016 at 2:00 p.m. on a beautiful warm February afternoon (an amazing 57 degrees) a steadfast group of 34 people attended the film showing on climate change. This was an excellent turnout for the event. Twenty-eight surveys were collected at the showing. Environmental Committee member Anne Stenzel had her student workers tabulate the survey results which documented that 71% of people taking the survey showed at least some improvement in their understanding of climate change after viewing the film. The Library partnered with Transition Mankato, the MSU Environmental Committee, and the Center for Earth Spirituality and Rural Ministry in the showing of the film. The film was purchased with institutional public performance rights for \$350. The Environmental Committee and Transition Mankato each provided \$100 to cover the cost of funding. 6. Carbon Footprint Update and Commuter Survey

All the data for the FY2014 and FY2015 updates have been compiled, with one exception: the inputs for commuting emissions. The inputs needed to estimate the greenhouse gas emissions from faculty, staff and student commuting are found from an analysis of the campus commuter survey conducted every spring. The spring 2015 commuter survey analysis has been done but not the spring 2014 analysis. It's anticipated that the spring 2014 analysis will be done soon, at which time the campus carbon footprint update for FY2014 and FY2015 can be completed. The campus carbon footprint will be updated for FY2016 after the close of the 2016 fiscal year on June 30, 2016. Ron Fields has coordinated the reporting of data for the Updates, Gary Urban has done the analysis of commuter surveys, and Lou Schwartzkopf has coordinated the analysis of the data. *Written by Lou Schwartzkopf*
